

Writing For The Fun Of It

We usually think that the word literacy refers to reading, but writing is also a component of literacy. Children as young as 12 months old can grasp a crayon and make marks on paper. At about 18 months, children often begin to scribble, and two-year-olds can use pencils, crayons, and markers to make drawings on paper. The writing of children 3 to 5 years old can include the letters of their names along with random letters and drawings. Our work with preschool children shows that they are very interested in engaging in writing activities and enjoy learning to write their names. Children's names are special to them and being able to write their names seems to be a major milestone. It is important to understand that young children are capable of writing more than their names. Engaging young children in activities involving writing the names of family members, pets, favorite foods with simple names (e.g., PBJ, cake, egg) and activities (e.g., zoo, store, pool) can work to strengthen the link between spoken letters, written sounds, and words.

The writing materials can be very simple – a piece of blank paper plus a stubby pencil, crayon or marker work just fine for very young children. Older children may be interested in writing with a regular non-mechanical pencil with a rubber grip to help them hold the pencil, although some children are only interested in regular pencils. Young children who like to draw pictures can be helped to label their pictures with simple words. We have found that preschool children also enjoy writing letters that are spoken to them. We usually start with simple high-frequency letters (e, t and a) and with letters in the child's name. Home writing activities such as these have been found to be very important for the development of reading skills.

Writing, along with reading story books, story telling, singing songs, and identifying word in their environments (stop, exit, elevator), logos (Target, McDonalds, Pepsi), and symbols (restroom, handicapped parking, restaurant), are activities that young children enjoy and that promotes early literacy skills.
