Researcher Spotlight – Dr. Kostas Fanti

Kostas A. Fanti holds a Ph.D. in Developmental Psychology (2007) from Georgia State University and is an Assistant Professor at the Department of Psychology, University of Cyprus. His bachelor's degree in Psychology is from the University of New Orleans (2002). His research interests include the development of child psychopathology, and how individual and social risk and protective factors are associated with the development of behavioral and emotional problems, including bullying and victimization.

Research

Dr. Fanti has received several research grants from the European commission and the Cyprus research promotion foundation. These grants enabled the collection of longitudinal data from children and adolescents to understand the development and co-development of bullying and victimization. His research into bullying began in 2009 and focused on (1) the prevalence and nature of school-based bullying and victimization in Cyprus, (2) the cross-sectional and longitudinal association of personality traits (i.e., callous-unemotional traits, narcissism, impulsivity) with bullying and victimization, (3) the longitudinal-transactional association between parent-child relationship quality and bullying and victimization, and (4) the co-occurrence between bullying and victimization.

One of the major contributions of Dr Fanti's work is the application of developmental methods to understand bullying and victimization. For example, he investigated the longitudinal-transactional association between parenting and bullying/victimization. These findings provide evidence that parenting behaviors (i.e., conflict and involvement) and child bullying behavior reciprocally influence each other, rather than one shaping the other in a unidirectional fashion. Using latent growth curve modeling, he provided evidence that bullying behaviors are more stable among youth scoring high on narcissism. Further, youth high on impulsivity show more stable victimization by peers across development. In

addition, adolescents high on both conduct problems and callous-unemotional traits tend to be at the greatest risk for engaging in bullying across development. Similar associations were identified for cyberbullying and cyber-victimization. His current work focuses on comparing bullies, victims, and bully-victims on different physiological measures investigating for differences in autonomic responses to positive and negative stimuli. Initial evidence suggests that bully-victims and bullies score lower on startle potentiation to fearful stimuli compared to victims, providing evidence for amygdala dysfunction. These findings are currently used to create a school-based intervention aiming to reduce the occurrence of bullying and victimization.
