Two Tenure-Track Bullying Prevention/Intervention Faculty Positions at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln

For the past decade the College of Education and Human Sciences at the University of Nebraska – Lincoln has supported the Bullying Research Network (BRNET), an international network of bullying prevention and intervention researchers. Building upon the success of BRNET, the College has developed the Empowerment Initiative that conducts translational research on bullying prevention and intervention. These two tenure-track faculty positions are integrally aligned with BRNET and the Empowerment Initiative and will be part of a **cluster hire of bullying prevention/intervention-related researchers**. We are seeking two scholars to contribute to our translational research foci on youth empowerment, youth engagement, and bullying prevention/intervention across homes, schools, and communities. Researcher Spotlight – Dr. Erika Felix

Erika Felix is an Assistant Professor of Clinical Psychology in the Department of Counseling, Clinical, and School Psychology at the University of California Santa Barbara (UCSB). She received her Ph.D. in clinical-community psychology from DePaul University. After completing a postdoctoral research fellowship at the Center for School-Based Youth Development (CSBYD) at UCSB, she continued as a professional researcher there for 10 years before joining the faculty in 2014. Her research is focused on understanding the individual, relational, and contextual factors that promote positive youth development or recovery despite contexts of risk, trauma, or stress; informing and evaluating prevention efforts; and improving service delivery. She has received funding from the U.S. National Institute of Mental Health, National Institute of Child Health & Human Development, Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Agency, private foundations, and local community organizations.

Dr. Felix began her research on school bullying when as a graduate student, she read that 60% of girls reported that they were mainly bullied by boys (Olweus, 1994). At the time, there was very little research on gender and bullying, or on adolescent sexual harassment. Consequently, her dissertation focused on understanding cross-sex peer victimization, which included an assessment of sexual harassment. She has continued research on the role of gender and ethnicity in the experience of peer victimization through research using large-scale datasets to understand victim subgroups and the role of the ethnic context of the school in victimization risk.

Along with CSBYD colleagues, Dr. Felix worked to improve self-report measurement of bullying so that it would reliably distinguish bullying from peer victimization without using a definition or the term "bully." They published the psychometric properties of the California Bully Victim Survey, which is now used in research throughout the world and is included in a compendium of bullying assessment resources compiled by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Dr. Felix recently traveled to Norway to meet with researchers there to discuss issues around defining and measuring bullying. Recently, Dr. Felix was part of the cross-university study of how past bullying experiences affect initial adjustment to college. She has also led efforts on evaluating school-based bullying prevention programs with Latino/a students, and exploring how peer victimization and bullying affect indicators of well-being and building blocks of social-emotional health.

U.S. Political/Policy Updates

BULLYING DEBATE COMES TO CAPITOL HILL: On the heels of the Senate HELP Committee's markup of No Child Left Behind, Sen. Bob Casey (D-Pa.) is looking for ways to get his proposed language on bullying into the education bill. "It's a great opportunity to finally - at long last - put this issue right on the front burner," Casey told Morning Education. "Because it's a pretty difficult issue to ignore if it gets to the Senate floor and you have to cast a vote on it." Both Casey and Sen. Al Franken (D-Minn.) withdrew proposals aiming to curb bullying in schools during the markup after the amendments garnered little Republican support. Republicans cited concerns about federal overreach. Casey's proposal would require states to have policies that prohibit bullying based on students race and LGBT status, among other things. It is based on a bill that had two Republican cosponsors - Sens. Mark Kirk (R-III.) and Lisa Murkowski (R-Alaska) - in 2013. But during last week's markup, Murkowksi expressed doubt about the measure. And a national debate over Indiana's religious freedom law makes for a charged climate when it comes to debating federal policies meant to protect gay and lesbian youth.

- Casey plans to keep in talks with Senate HELP Committee Chairman Lamar Alexander and others
 as NCLB moves ahead, but he said he doesn't think Alexander's proposed language on bullying is
 strong enough. "It might be we're still at loggerheads" by the time the bill gets to the floor, Casey
 said.
- Meanwhile on K Street: The Human Rights Campaign hired Epplin Strategic Planning's Robert Epplin, former legislative director for Sen. Susan Collins (R-Maine), to lobby issues including bullying of LGBT youth. HRC Government Affairs Director David Stacy said the group is "strongly urging" lawmakers to include both Franken and Casey's anti-bullying language in NCLB. "We will continue to push for those bills to be included when the bill moves to the Senate floor," Stacy said.
- And in bullying news outside the beltway: Montana is no longer the only state in the country without an anti-bullying law. The law Gov. Steve Bullock signed into law will ban students and

teachers from bullying students in all K-12 public schools and give parents and authorities a path to go after bullies and others that break the law. More: http://gftrib.com/1DAXmRy.
