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HIM

Replace the noun(s) with the appropriate pronoun, or identify the existing pronoun.

Sally went to the store. (She)

That book belongs to Harry. (It/Him)

My mom and dad don't let me stay up late. (My/They/Me)

I told my dogs to stop barking. (I/Them)

Those books are mine. (Mine)

Robert, Shelby, and I deserve more than that. (We)

Have you seen the way Sandy looks at Colton? (You/She/Him)

Sometimes Mike and Frank find excellent deals. (They)

Can you imagine what Lauren and Nicole feel like? (You/They)

There are so many things that Kody did that I never could. (He/I)

You and I should hang out sometime. (We or You/I)

Our family will be leaving to go to Florida in the morning. (We/Our)

This homework was very confusing that class. (It/Them)

Can't you understand how that makes Charlotte feel? (You/Her)

Gregory doesn't know how this works. (He)

Sam says that Meredith is the best person for the job. (He/She/It)

On the field trip, our class went to the abandoned village. (We)

Howard and Sheldon do not get along. (They)

That car belongs to Desmond. (It/Him)

Sometimes I can't believe how you act. (I/You)

Without a doubt, Raymond is the sorest loser on the team. (He)

Mine are over by the couch. (Mine)

Lucy can't go to Linda's party. (She/Her)

Frodo couldn't go to Mordor without Sam. (He/Him)

Harry Potter is the boy who lived. (He)

Aren't you afraid of The Great and Powerful Oz? (You/Him)

I bet you can run faster than Tom. (I/You/Him)

Sometimes I wonder what Harry's plan is. (I/His)

Did you see what Terrin did to Kaitlin? (You/He/Her)

There is nothing for you to see here! (You)

The makeup belongs to Sheila. (Her)

Bob shouldn't go to work today. (He)

Katie, Rosco, and Jim all went to play in the park. (They)

Have you ever been to the Santiago Islands? (You)

I have never seen anything like that. (I)

Dancing in the rain is something that all of them like to do. (Them)

I hope you are happy. (I/You)

PRONOUNS

Pronouns are words that replace nouns.

Common/frequently used pronouns:

I	Mine	Yours	His	Hers	Us	Them	Theirs
Me	You	He	She	We	Ours	They	It

Singular and plural pronouns:

Singular pronouns replace a singular noun.

I, Me, You, He, She, It

Sarah was very happy.
She was very happy.

Sarah is the singular noun, so we can replace it with the singular pronoun, "she."

Plural pronouns replace plural nouns.

We, Us, Them, They

Jack and Jill went up the hill.
They went up the hill.

Jack and Jill is a group of two people, which makes them plural, so they will be replaced by the plural noun,

Possessive pronouns:

Possessive pronouns show ownership.

Mine, Yours, His, Hers, Ours, Theirs, Its

The book belongs to William.
The book belongs to him.

Because the book belongs to William, we use a possessive pronoun that shows ownership. "Him" is the appropriate pronoun.

Subject and object pronouns:

Subject pronouns replace the subject of the sentence. They are the ones *doing* something.

Oliver sings well.
He sings well.

Oliver is the subject of the sentence.

Object pronouns replace the noun that is having something *done to it*.

The team passed the ball to Wendy.
The team passed the ball to her.

The ball is being passed *to her*, so Wendy should be replaced with an object pronoun.

Which is correct? "He and I went to the store" or "Me and him went to the store?" Try taking the other person out. Now it is "I went to the store" or "Me went to the store," which is correct? It should be easier to tell now!
