- The passing of another luminary in psychology: Aaron T. Beck, M.D., at 100. From Frank Farley, Ph.D., Former President of APA: "Tim Beck was my dear friend and a true giant of psychology and psychiatry. His Cognitive Behavior Therapy (CBT) is used with great effect by therapists worldwide and is probably the most widely used approach that we have. Although a psychiatrist, he was a Fellow of APA. (His daughter Dr. Judith Beck, a psychologist, heads the Beck Institute for Cognitive Behavior Therapy and is a leading figure in CBT). For the past 12 years or so I have conducted a Conversation Hour with Tim at the APA Annual Meeting. They were amazing, they were profound, and always attracted among the largest attendance at the Convention. Because the Convention occurred close to the date of his birthday, I would open the sessions with an audience singing of Happy Birthday! He always enjoyed that! He was 99 at our last Conversation Hour! He was a warm, welcoming person, and a brilliant scholar, teacher, scientist and therapist who has influenced psychology and psychiatry profoundly." 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

ANNOUNCEMENTS

- The EDPS faculty enjoyed a full-day fall retreat at Venue Restaurant and Lounge on Friday, November 5th. One of our most famous graduates, Dr. Tom Osborne, gave a wonderful welcome kick-off to the retreat. Dr. Osborne earned his MA in Educational Psychology at UNL in 1963. His thesis was entitled, "A Study of Programed Instruction as Applied to Learning of Football Plays" and his advisor was Robert E. Stack. In 1965, Dr. Osborne earned his Ph.D. in Educational Psychology. His dissertation research, "The Effects of Instructions on Situational Anxiety Level and Examination Performance" was co-chaired by Dr. Warren R. Baller and Dr. G. Robert Ross.
- As many of you know, Dr. Osborne was the head football coach at UNL from 1973 to 1997; he retired with a career record of 255-49-3 and his teams earned 13 conference titles and three national championships; he was

our US Congressman from the 3rd district from 2001-2007; and he co-founded with his wife, Nancy, the TeamMates mentoring program that provides mentoring for youth across Nebraska, Iowa, North and South Dakota, Kansas, and Wyoming. Many of our students and faculty are TeamMates mentors in Lincoln Public Schools. In 2013, Dr. Osborne was honored as the CEHS distinguished alumnus.

Dr. John Raible, CEHS Associate Dean for Diversity and Inclusion worked with the faculty on "Diversity, equity, inclusion, and belonging: Necessary and vital for the future of the academy" and Dr. Raible gave us a great start on conducting DEI course audits and self-reflection. It was great to be together after a year of Zoom meetings. A big shout-out to Edith, who organized a wonderful retreat!

- The College of Education and Human Sciences Staff Council is partnering with the Refugee Empowerment Center host a donation drive to support refugees coming to Nebraska. The refugee donation drive will be held Nov. 13, 10 a.m. 2 p.m. on the East Campus Mall, north of 35th and Holdrege Streets in Lincoln. All are welcome to attend.
 - The idea for the donation drive originated within the CEHS Staff Council after word came earlier in the fall that approximately 775 evacuees from Afghanistan are expected to settle in Nebraska. The group is part of the first evacuees resettled across the country after they fled from Afghanistan when U.S. troops withdrew in August. The refugee drive is intended to support these evacuees and other refugees in Nebraska.
 - The donated items will be donated directly to the Refugee Empowerment Center in Omaha. The Center resettles refugees who are transitioning from vastly different backgrounds into American life. Their focus is helping clients live and work productively, further their education, and achieve a better life for themselves and their children.
 - Requested items include:
 - Grocery gift cards and bus tickets, kitchen supplies such as boilers, coffee makers, rice cookers and utensils, lamps and light bulbs (energy efficient), new mattresses with bed frames, bedsheets, pillows and blankets, small appliances such as microwaves, toasters, TV sets, laptops, tablets, mobile phones (in working condition), small furniture such as coffee tables and lamp stands, winter clothing such as adult and children's coats/jackets, socks, hats, gloves, t-shirts, sweaters, scarves, shoes and boots
 - The donation drive will also feature recognized student organizations, like the Afghan Student Association, as well as cultural food trucks, and other activities to help people in the college and the community become familiar with other cultures found in their neighborhoods. The event is an opportunity to learn more about incoming Afghan refugees and current refugees in the community, and become empowered to build positive relationships.

Upcoming Association for Behavioral and Cognitive Therapies (ABCT) Conference Presentations (November 16-21, 2021—Virtual: https://www.abct.org/2021-convention/)

• Catie Carney (SchPsych), Dr. Swearer, and colleagues will present their poster titled, "I Think, Therefore I Act: Cognitive Distortions in Youth Involved in Bullying" at the ABCT 2021 Annual Conference. Results from a Tier-III cognitive-behavioral intervention for bullying behaviors found that students who identified as pure bullies endorsed greater distortions in thinking related to selfcentered thoughts, minimizing and mislabeling the effects of their behaviors, and assuming the worst in situations, and these endorsements fell within the borderline clinical and clinical range, highlighting the importance of addressing and modifying cognitions in youth who are involved in bullying.

- Guadalupe Gutierrez, Linnea Swanson, Raul Palacios, Cesar Torres (SchPsych) and Dr. Swearer will present their poster titled, "Principal Component Analysis of the Verbal and Physical Bullying Scale for Latinx Youth." This poster examines the cross-cultural reliability and validity of the Verbal and Physical Bullying Scale (VPBS) among a Spanish-speaking international Latinx sample. The VPBS yielded three components for the Victimization scale and two components for the Bullying scale for the Latinx sample. The Victimization scale loaded into components of Physical/Relational, Verbal, and Cyber, and the bullying scale loaded into Physical/Relational and Verbal components. This varies from the English version of the VPBS, illustrating the need to expand knowledge regarding commonalities and distinctions in bullying involvement and assessment of bullying across ethnic groups.
- Cara White, Samantha Kesselring (SchPsych), and Dr. Swearer will present their poster titled, "Does Involvement in Bullying Differ Across Sexual Minority Status?" This presentation includes results from a larger, international study designed to understand the social experiences of youth and young adults at ages 13-25 years old. This study focused on participants who identified as lesbian, gay, bisexual, and queer (LGBQ) and questioning youth, and assessing their involvement in bullying and sexual identity status (i.e., identity affirmation and internalized homonegativity). Questioning youth, as compared to their LGBQ counterparts, had higher levels of internalized homonegative beliefs and lower levels of identity affirmation. Questioning youth also experienced higher levels of relational and cybervictimization and perpetrated higher levels of bullying, compared to LGBQ youth.
- Emilea Rejman (SchPsych), Dr. W. John Monopoli (from Florida International University) and Dr. Steven Evans (from Ohio University) will present their poster titled, "Risk and Protective Factors for Bullying Behavior in Adolescence." This poster includes results evaluating risk factors (i.e., normative beliefs about aggression and emotion regulation) and protective factors (i.e., parental involvement and parental warmth) and their association with bullying behavior.



- With funding from UNL's Center for Transformative Teaching, Dr. Ken Kiewra received a Grant for Innovating Student Success. His project, "Talent Accomplishments Among Racial and Ethnic Minorities," invited two renowned race scholars to converse with his first-year Honors class, which studies creativity and talent development.
 - The scholars were Dr. Carol D. Lee, Professor Emeritus in the School of Education and Social Policy and in African Studies at Northwestern University, recipient of the 2021 American Educational Research Association (AERA) Distinguished Contributions to Research in Education Award, and Dr. Zeus Leonardo, Professor of Education at the University of California, Berkeley, recipient of the 2021 AERA Scholars of Color Distinguished Career Contribution Award.
 - In this Honors course, students explore the creative and talented through readings and by interviewing talented guests that they or Professor Kiewra invite to class. Guests over the years have included, for example, highly talented musicians, runners, dancers, divers, chess players, coaches, rock climbers, poker players, engineers, and entrepreneurs. Rarely, however, have talent guests been from historically underrepresented populations until Drs. Lee and Leonardo conversed with the class during the fall 2021 semester.
 - The class learned about the scholars' work on the roles of race and class in education, structural factors that often inhibit the education and talents of individuals from historically underrepresented groups, and the personal talent journeys of Drs. Lee and Leonardo.
